# **Guidelines for Ph.D. Projects**

#### Prof. Dr. Rafael Biermann

#### 1. Application:

- We expect students to apply with excellent M.A. exams and a proven record of academic achievement.
- An international background is very welcome. Theses can be written in English.
- The field of research needs to correspond to the academic profile of Prof. Biermann.
- Applicants should have a strong background in the discipline of International Relations, including theory and methods. If they come from other disciplinary backgrounds, the Faculty will require additional course work.
- All applications should be sent as hard copies to our secretariat (address: http://www.powi.uni-jena.de/kontakt-ib.html); please no email requests.
- Applications should contain:
  - Letter of interest
  - Research proposal (puzzle, guiding question, main argument, theoretical and methodological approach, timeline, financing options, 5-10 pp.)
  - Curriculum vitae (including all academic degrees with marks so far)
  - M.A. Thesis (electronic version sufficient)
  - Copies of university degrees
  - For non-natives: proof of capacity to draft a book-length academic publication in English (such as TOEFL)

# 2. Goals

- A focused, well-structured and intense Ph.D. of around three years, subdivided into meaningful phases to increase accountability and monitor progress
- Substantial mentoring of individual projects
- Embeddedness in the international as well as the local research community
- Page length between <u>200 and 350 pp</u>. (longer manuscripts not accepted in view of later publication)

#### 3. Start-up phase

- Intense cooperation on the research design
- Assistance in financing the project, be it via <u>scholarship</u> application (letter of recommendation), employment at the Department of Political Science, or otherwise
- Final decision on the project only after joint agreement on a substantial research proposal

- Start-up phase ends with Ph.D. candidate and professor agreeing on the research design (Exposé) and signing the official mentoring agreement of Jena University (<a href="http://www.iga.uni-jena.de/Betreuungsvereinbarung.290.0.html">http://www.iga.uni-jena.de/Betreuungsvereinbarung.290.0.html</a>). The mentoring agreement is obligatory for all Ph.Ds.
- Please familiarize yourself early with the guiding documents of Jena University, especially with the "Promotionsordnung". All relevant documents can be retrieved from the Webpage of Prof. Biermann.

# 4. Research Proposal (Exposé)

- Including a puzzle, relevance of the topic, literature review, theoretical approach, methods used, structure of the Thesis (including envisaged pages per chapter), timeline
- Discussed and improved individually with the professor step by step

#### 5. Research process

- Research progress will be closely monitored by
  - presentation and in-depth discussion of the research progress two times a year within two <u>Early Career Workshops</u> we hold for all of our Ph.D. candidates in March (Volkenroda in Eastern Thuringia) and in October (Jena) each year – these workshops are <u>obligatory</u> and are open to others considering a Ph.D.
  - submission of a short <u>progress report</u> before each presentation, including achievements, but also (personal) shortfalls and hurdles and specific goals with deadlines for the next phase
  - o individual feedback and <u>one-on-one meetings</u> with the professor discussing progress and the way ahead
- A second reader should be chosen as early as possible to profit from his or her expertise during the Ph.D. project. The reader should be a professor. He or she can come from Jena or from other national or international universities. If the project is interdisciplinary in nature, a professor from another discipline might be integrated. This needs to be closely coordinated with Prof. Biermann.
- You do not have to attend classes during your PhD, except if you have to catch up on some topics.
- In case of insufficient progress not related to *force majeur* the professor reserves the right to end the project after close consultation.

#### 6. Handing in your dissertation

- Please coordinate well ahead with Prof. Biermann when to hand in your dissertation.
- The Faculty decides whether to accept a dissertation. Applications cannot be handled during the semester break, except for advance applications being forwarded to the Faculty during the preceding semester.

- Expect several months to pass before you get your final grade.
- The <u>disputation</u> usually focuses on your PhD topic. First and second reader plus a chair from another institute of the faculty attend. You can also invite family and colleagues.
- Jena University does not pay for second readers to come to Jena for the final Ph.D. disputation.

### 5. Further Expectations and Offers

- Presentation of your Ph.D. project outline at an <u>international conference</u> in order to get feedback from peers and network with those working in your field. Subsequently, if possible once a year presentation of the research at a conference on the Ph.D. candidate's initiative
- Stimulation to start publishing before turning in the dissertation
- Expectation to <u>teach a class</u> at our Department's B.A. or M.A. program in International Relations, primarily on the Ph.D. topic; first time coaching by or coteaching with an experienced faculty member
- Involvement in the Institute's projects according to one's own availability and interest, including *inter alia* participation in or initiation of externally funded research projects, joint publications, conferences, lectures in our double diploma in Kiev etc.
- Support to do some of the Ph.D. research abroad, both short-term or longer-term
- Invitation of guest lecturers upon your initiative, in particular on <our Ph.D. topic
- Options to recommend books of general interest for the Institute's library, which might also be utilized for the Ph.D.
- Support on organizing field trips
